Anton Karl Eberhard, 68, of Nashua died at St. Joseph Hospital on October 8, 2010 following a brief illness.

Mr. Eberhard was born in Bad Frankenhausen, Germany on January 6, 1942, a son of the late Karl Eugene and Helene Therese

(Otto) Eberhard.

Mr. Eberhard was the husband of Pamela M. (Hossack) Eberhard, whom he married on March 6, 1967. They shared 43 years of marriage.

He was educated in Germany and received his master's degree in Tool and Dye Making in Reutlingen in 1969.

Most recently, he had started his own tool and dye company, Nashua Precision Tooling. Prior to which, he had worked for International Shoe Machine Company in Boston and then in Nashua for over 25 years.
